Tēnā koutou

At our all-staff meeting at the start of 2018, we spoke about the things that Laidlaw College has stood for since 1922. Looking back through the founding deed that established the Bible Training Institute, or reading College prospectuses from the 1960s, or talks given at churches in the 1990s, four clear commitments hold true across the decades. We have begun informally calling them our "four affirmations":

The Bible is our Story

Foundational to all our work is the conviction that those who follow Christ are called to cultivate a distinctive life of the mind that begins in Scripture and leads to creative participation in God's work of renewing the world. During 2018 we offered seventeen accredited courses directly on the Bible, from level four Encountering the Bible, to Masters courses in Hebrew Wisdom and The Gospel and its Proclamation. Beyond these papers however, all our programmes, and the practices of our wider College community life, seek to ground the learning of students in the Bible – forming graduates who can move intelligently from Scripture to life.

Jesus is our Lord

Study at Laidlaw is not only a path to a qualification, but an invitation to formation and transformation. Jesus gives us a model of what it means to learn and be human that goes beyond the reductively economic, socially determined or narrowly autonomous to a fuller picture of personal and communal flourishing. It is because Christ is Lord that we seek social justice, wise policy, educational pathways, cultural flourishing, relational wholeness, economic wellbeing, and the renewal of every sphere of life. We hope that an outsider walking into Laidlaw this year or any year will see the implications of this vision in how we gather to pray, worship, study or love our neighbours.

The Church is our Community

During 2018 more than 100 students studied towards Laidlaw programmes through our partnerships that span New Zealand's denominations. We are now teaching evening classes via video-conference into churches, and continue to run workshops around the country on topics such as preaching and counselling

communities through trauma. We are blessed to be served by our Runanga, Pasifika Council, Christchurch Advisory Council, Disability Reference Group, and other groups who guide Laidlaw as we seek to serve an increasingly diverse Church. Highlights from our wider service of the Church included the launch of a Central Auckland chapter of our *Engage* pastors' network, supporting dozens of leaders' gatherings around New Zealand, and a well-attended conference on what mission looks like in an intercultural church.

Renewal is our Vocation

The work of our graduates in their communities is the clearest expression of our mission. It is a joy every year to meet those who are preaching, developing social enterprises, leading organisational change, speaking through art, forming young lives, or working for justice in broken communities, because they have studied at Laidlaw. One example of the many ways that our commitment to working out the Gospel mission in our world was shown in 2018 through *Whakawhiti kōrero*, a conference that gathered practitioners and academics across many disciplines to discuss how theology can better inform social practice and vice versa.

Looking forward into 2019, the College finds itself well-positioned in the midst of a changing environment. Government reviews are likely to result in significant change for the tertiary sector. We are encouraged by enrolments, but mindful of the need to continue to grow pathways to form leaders for the future of the Church – especially for Māori and Pasifika, and for theologically-grounded leaders in the wider marketplace.

Thank you for continuing to walk with us in support and prayer, as we continue to affirm that *The Bible is our Story; Jesus is our Lord; The Church is our Community; and Renewal is our Vocation.*

In 2018 the Runanga continued to play a pivotal role in the life of the College at ceremonial occasions for student orientation, graduation, and various conferences.

The Runanga supported the reo and bicultural components for Year 1 programmes, and hosted the marae noho once again. Runanga member Bradford Haami took over from Val Goold as coordinator of the course. It was the first time the Runanga had engaged directly with the Christchurch campus in many years.

The Graduate Diploma of Theology's Indigenous Theology track, initiated by the Runanga, completed its final year of the first round in 2018. The Theology Degree Monitor's report commended the programme as a positive step for Laidlaw College, and noted that the programme continues to meet a need within the community. Seth Barratt, Bradford Haami, and Denise Tims are the first to complete the full programme and graduated in April 2019.

The Runanga also entered into a joint venture with the Baptist Union Māori Strategic team to publish a tikanga Māori manual for churches. This is an ongoing project.

Many thanks to all Runanga members for their service to the college and the community.



BOOK LAUNCH

Senior Lecturer, Dr Mark Keown gave a public lecture to accompany the launch of his new two volume series - Jesus in a World of Colliding Empires.



We celebrated Pasifika student success at a pre-graduation dinner which included a creative presentation of the Biblical narrative. A week later we celebrated the successful completion of programmes of 114 Laidlaw students at our Auckland Graduation ceremony.

Laidlaw Henderson hosted Intercultural Church: Becoming One People, a conference over 11-12 May to help pastors and leaders consider the question of how New Zealand churches move from diversity to inclusion in an increasingly multi-ethnic society.

Pasifika Report

The Pasifika student cohort continues to flourish with ongoing customised academic and pastoral support and participation in college life. The 2018 Pasifika Student Committee worked hard to serve their peers and to build a tight-knit supportive community under the leadership of education student Annie Tuai-Vailea (Semester 1, 2018) and counselling student Tillie Lima (Semester 2, 2018).

Some Pasifika initiatives have been adopted into mainstream college support and events. A Tokouso-buddy support (student buddy system) is now offered to all new students, and a Family Luau Nite has joined the College calendar. Families are invited to come and see where their students study, enjoy good food and entertainment, and hear how their students can best be supported. 'Pasifika Inspire', an event featuring personal testimonies of Pasifika professionals and prayer ministry, was incorporated into the 2019 Orientation Week and renamed 'Student Inspire'. There has also been a marked increase of Pasifika representation on the Henderson Student Leadership Team which serves the entire student body. Elections in 2018 resulted in half of the team for 2019 being of Pasifika descent.


Student achievement was celebrated with a Pasifika Graduands' dinner in April 2018, preceded by a creative interpretative performance of the Biblical narrative. Helping with the performance was Loma Uhila, a third year Counselling student. With a passion for performing arts, over the past three years Loma and her team have trained children during the school holidays. In October 2018, Loma's group 'Kingdom Challenges' performed in front of a packed theatre presenting the story of the Bible through drama and music. It was a colourful show, artfully stringing together familiar Sunday School stories into the panoramic story of Scripture.

At this year's Pasifika Graduands' Dinner, special mention was made of Taniela Moala, a theology student who began studies in a Level 4 Certificate of Preparatory Studies course, and completed his MTh in 2018. We also announced with excitement the work of faculty member Dr Terry Pouono, who will be developing a suite of Pacific papers over the next few years. The first course will offer a survey of major developments in the history of Christianity in the Pacific.

Towards the end of 2018, networking breakfast meetings were held at our Manukau Campus to engage further with community leaders in South Auckland. Some important connections with key church leaders were made, and insights gained on how Laidlaw could best meet the needs of Pasifika people.



A Journey into Indigenous Theology Studies

Denise Tims, GradDipTh

In 2018 the Indigenous Theology track of the *Graduate Diploma of Theology* finished its first four-year cycle of eight courses. Denise Tims, one of the first to complete the full programme, reflects on her indigenous theology journey:

I am of Ngāti Porou, Ngāti Raukawa, Ngapuhi, English and Scottish descent. I am a wife, mother and member of Urban Neighbours of Hope, an apostolic order of the Baptist Churches of NZ.

From a western perspective, I have discovered many wonderful truths of God over the past 30 years of being a Jesus disciple. However, I have also lived in a tension, where many questions regarding spirituality, Māoritanga and God have been difficult to answer. Most theology that permeates our churches, institutions and literature is dominated by a Pākehā and western lens. I have wanted to challenge both sides of my cultural heritage and spirituality, and be able to place an indigenous and western lens upon Scripture and life to seek a deeper truth.

In 2014, Laidlaw College introduced a Māori theological track for undergraduates and it was here that my formal indigenous theological study began. I have thoroughly enjoyed being in a positive, predominantly Māori, environment where the sharing of cultural issues is generally understood and where learning from Scripture and each other is respected. Approaching theology from an indigenous perspective has been refreshing and has allowed me to grapple with where culture and God both align and clash. I have been strengthened, encouraged and empowered in my faith, and enriched by a deeper understanding of God. I feel better equipped with tools to discern truth. This course has provided an environment to foster a stronger informed indigenous voice that I hope I can offer to our land and our people.

Of all the places you could work, what compels you to keep coming to Laidlaw?

I love the warm hospitable culture, all my colleagues in Christchurch and Auckland, our students, the intellectual stimulation and the clear sense that God is here in this place. Laidlaw has shaped me in so many wonderful ways. Through Laidlaw I have learnt the integration of theology and psychology in thoughtful ways, and I enjoy the critical thinking about all that I do and say. Something comes alive for me when I teach and often the only way I can describe it is this, "When I teach, I feel God's pleasure."

What would you say to a friend who was thinking about studying at Laidlaw?

Laidlaw is an amazing place to study. The lecturers and courses are engaging, there is robust learning as well as a nurturing community undergirded by values that reflect God's hospitality and relationality.

What inspires you to do what you do?

I'm a bridge builder and love to think systematically about what I believe, so being a Theologian in the School of Social Practice is a great fit for me. I want to do systematic theology based on the whole story of the Bible. The gospel is about transforming the way we live and interact with others, so it is important that Christians know their theology when they go into vocations where lives are being transformed.


What would you say to someone who was thinking about studying at Laidlaw?

Laidlaw is a great place for growing your knowledge of God, his Word, his people, and yourself. It is thoroughly evangelical, while open to other voices within the broader church – so you will hear things which are different to what you have heard before. Laidlaw will challenge you and sometimes you will feel stretched beyond what you thought you could cope with. But it's a nurturing place, with staff who really want to stand beside you as you work through what you helieve



What compels you to keep coming to Laidlaw?

Three main things inspire me to do what I do (which includes driving all the way to Henderson from Howick to do it). 1 - I know that I was directed by God to Laidlaw. Not only can I work from my passions, but I am also shaped and fed by being part of the college. 2 - the people. I love my colleagues. They are super encouraging, cheering me on in my own studies, and personal and professional growth. I had never worked in a team where the leader lives out the espoused beliefs of a shared leadership structure and commitment to social justice. There is true collaboration and commitment to the other. 3 - I simply love working with the students. To grow great teachers who will go out and impact the children of the future is a great responsibility and one that none of the team hold lightly. The students are why we are here and the interactions I get to have with them sustain me through some of the more mundane everyday tasks.



Teaching theology is a wonderful learning experience. This learning comes through continuous meditation with the Word of God, lecture notes, dialogue with students and getting to put my learning into practice.

What kinds of learning are you looking forward to in the coming years?

I am passionate about research connected with Pacific churches in Aotearoa, Pacific students studying theology, and providing a theological response to various social issues Pacific people are facing in contemporary NZ.

What do you hope for your students?

My hope for our students is that they are inspired to live into Laidlaw's vision – a world shaped by love, compelled and informed by the Gospel, using their knowledge and gifts to serve their churches faithfully. Not only their churches, but also serving in various sectors of the wider society that require a prophetic voice undergirded by the gospel.



What inspired Whakawhiti Korero?

Tim: It started over 20 years ago when the College introduced counselling training. The immediate focus was "how do we integrate?" Since then, and through the growth of our programmes, the counselling faculty have worked on integrating theology and counselling.

Lisa: In 2017 we published *Stories of Therapy, Stories of Faith* which included contributions from faculty, students, practitioners and other academics. We invited Tim to speak at the book launch and engage with it from a theological perspective. He basically said: "It's a good book. You need to talk to more theologians. The next step is a conference."

Tim: My point was; "this is good work by trained counsellors who are trying to bring theology in." The clear next step was to get theologians and counsellors talking with and learning from each other. Not just from the point of view that "counsellors aren't doing their theology well enough, they need our help" but considering that theologians also need to engage with social practice to enhance their work.

Lisa: We're both passionate about the reciprocity of ideas. There is gold in what each other brings and we wanted to make space for learning from each other in conversation.

What happened over the two-day conference?

Lisa: We formatted the conference so the different practices, groups of ideas and disciplines could interact with each other. 63 participants joined us from across New Zealand, Australia and Canada.

Tim: Our keynote speakers were an Old Testament scholar and a Psychologist who both had experience related to the other discipline and were able to speak from their strengths and engage with other perspectives.

Lisa: Tim and I started the conference by presenting our papers and interacting with each other's work. We wanted to model the kind of conversation we might have – to offer and hear other perspectives. It was a fun thing to do!

What is a highlight from the conference?


Lisa: I enjoyed hearing how participants were engaging with the presentations and thinking them back into their own contexts asking questions like "what does this mean for my life and work?"


Tim: People were happy with it but there's more to do. I sensed a kind of holy discontent - we've tasted and seen that this is not yet good enough. It's important that we met - that is an achievement - but there is appetite for more.

What's next?

Tim: We need to have another conference and Lisa and I are editing a book. We'd like to publish a series of essays from these conversations. The other 'what next' is that we need to be much better internally at this integration. This conference was a good step and a public display of areas that we want to strengthen and develop as more of a conversation.

Laidlaw College's Statement of Faith

LAIDLAW COLLEGE SHALL UPHOLD THE TRUTHS OF THE HISTORIC CHRISTIAN FAITH, INCLUDING THE FOLLOWING ITEMS OF BELIEF:

- There is one true God, infinite and all powerful, eternally existing in three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- God is loving and merciful, holy and just and is the creator and sustainer of all things.
- God has revealed himself in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. All Scripture is uniquely inspired by God and is therefore wholly trustworthy and of supreme and final authority in faith and life.
- Jesus Christ is God's only Son and God incarnate. He was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary and lived a perfect and sinless human life. He was sent to reveal God, to proclaim the reign of God in the power of the Holy Spirit, and to accomplish God's saving purposes.
- Christ died on the cross for our sins as our representative and substitute. God raised him from the dead through the power of the Spirit and he is exalted at the right hand of the Father, having received all authority in heaven and on earth.
- Human beings are made in the image of God. They are created to love, worship and enjoy fellowship with God and have been entrusted with the stewardship of God's creation.

- Through human disobedience to God, sin and death entered the world. All have sinned and are therefore guilty before God and under God's judgement. Sin separates people from God; it also brings brokenness to human relationships, disrupts the created order and distorts humanity's relationship with creation.
- Salvation is the gift of God's grace through the death of Jesus Christ, and is available to all who repent of their sins and by faith receive him as Saviour and Lord. They are born again by the Holy Spirit, thereby becoming children of God.
- Through the Spirit's indwelling, God's people are enabled to live holy lives and are equipped, in the fellowship of the Church, to witness and work for Christ and to glorify God in the world.
- The Church is the community of all Christian believers, who have been formed by the Holy Spirit into one body of which the Lord Jesus Christ is the Head.
- The Church is commissioned by Christ to bear witness to the Gospel to all peoples through word, deed and sign.
- Christ will return in power and glory to consummate God's kingdom. He will gather his people, judge the world in righteousness, and renew creation. Those outside of Christ will be raised to eternal judgement; those who belong to Christ will be raised to enjoy eternal life in God's presence.

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
