Presenter: Miriam Jessie Fisher

WHERE HOPE LIVES: STRENGTHS AND STRUGGLES OF YOUNG PEOPLE

This seminar explores the state of today's young people—highlighting encouraging trends like reduced crime and violence, while confronting the rise in loneliness and anxiety. Together we'll consider where hope is already growing, where it's still desperately needed, and how the offering of Christ-like communities can grow thriving young people.

TE RONGOPAI & TE TIRITI: A PARTNERSHIP OF HOPE

Presenter: Antony Nihoniho

Our hope for a reconciled way forward for Māori and Pākehā is continually challenged. The issues are complex and the history fraught. As Christians in Aotearoa New Zealand and affiliates of Laidlaw College, we have an active role to play in God's hopes for us all. Our Christian predecessors inspired and established Te Tiriti o Waitangi as a foundation for our country. How do we apply it, as Christians, in 2025 and beyond?

Based on Antony's current doctoral research of relationships with whenua (land), he will suggest a way of articulating the relationships forged at Waitangi that include manaenhancing identities for ALL New Zealanders. He will also rearticulate our colonial history and aspirations for a way forward collectively that seeks Gospel-inspired unity reflecting biblical and Māori values.

ESCHATOLOGICAL PATIENCE: RETHINKING EXPECTATIONS OF GOD, OURSELVES, AND THE FUTURE

Presenter: Rev. Dr Maja Whitaker

This seminar explores the tension between Christian hope and human limitation, inviting us to examine their unspoken expectations about God, ourselves, and the nature of life in a broken world. Drawing from personal stories, theological reflection, and creative contemplation, we will challenge the prosperity-tinged narratives that are too-often characteristic of Western Christianity. A reframing of hope through the lens of "eschatological patience" encourages a compassionate realism that embraces weakness, finds comfort in Christ's resurrection, and lives faithfully in anticipation of new creation.

PROBLEMS WITH FORGIVENESS

Presenter: Dr Richard Neville

Interpersonal forgiveness is integral to the Christian faith. Its importance cannot be doubted when we consider that it is the only ethical practice Jesus included in the prayer he taught us, "Forgive us our debts as we also have forgiven our debtors" (Matthew 6:12). By embedding it in the prayerlife of the church, Jesus ensured we could never forget how important it is to forgive. However, the Christian teaching on interpersonal forgiveness is not without its problems. In recent years more and more Christian writers have questioned the traditional view of forgiveness. They maintain that Jesus never intended for us to practice unconditional forgiveness. Forgiveness, they argue, is only offered when the guilty party repents. On the other hand, is it the case that our heavenly Father really withholds forgiveness from any Christian who fails to forgive (Matthew 6:14-15)? What about the deeply damaged victim of abuse or the parent of an abducted and murdered child? In this seminar we will look at some problems with forgiveness and suggest possible solutions.
