- Those who have successfully completed a recognised undergraduate degree in theology or Christian ministries or have qualifications which, in the judgement of the Postgraduate Committee (PGC), are of an equivalent standard. A grade point average of 7.0 (B) in courses of the qualifying undergraduate programme equivalent to NZQA Levels 6 and 7 is required.
- Those who hold a recognised Bachelor's level degree in a discipline other than
 theology who have successfully completed a bridging programme of theological
 study such as those provided by Laidlaw College and other theological institutions
 or as approved by the PGC. Bridging requirements may be satisfied wholly or partly
 by credit transfer and/or recognition of prior learning.

R140.830 THE GOSPEL AND ITS PROCLAMATION

22 - 26 May | 9am - 4pm

Our everyday world is an increasingly dynamic mix of faiths, philosophies, cultures, and ideologies in both local and global contexts. In such a world, Christians and their communities still have the imperative to share Christ but often struggle with traditional paradigms of the gospel and its effective proclamation. This course goes deeply into New Testament exploring diverse understandings of the gospel to strengthen our capacity to present the gospel today. It also explores patterns of its proclamation, providing a basis for sharing the gospel in posture, proclamation, and praxis in the complex cultural landscapes that exist within Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

R405.830 MENTAL HEALTH AND HUMAN FLOURISHING

Dr Maja Whittaker and Dr Sarah Penwarden

27 - 31 March | 9:30am - 4:30pm

Mental distress can be a common but challenging aspect of human experience. In this course, students will explore how to understand mental distress from within the framework of practical theology. Students will learn how to articulate a theology of mental distress as well as human flourishing and shalom, through a focus on mental health in general and particular experiences such as anxiety, depression and bipolar disorder. Students will gain an understanding of issues of stigma surrounding mental distress in society. Students will evaluate pastoral responses to mental distress, and will articulate an understanding of what a wise, compassionate, and informed pastoral response might involve within the varied cultural contexts of Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

R507.830 ANOINTED MINISTRY

Dr Myk Habets

1-5 May | Mon-Fri 9:30am - 4:30pm, Fri 9:30am-1pm This course examines the doctrine of the Trinity and applies this to pastoral practices in order to allow the doctrine of the Trinity to have a controlling influence over such practices. This course addresses key concerns related to the practice of ministry. By grounding the course in a robust trinitarianism, students will receive a clear biblical and theological foundation for ministry as participation in the ongoing ministry of Christ in the world in the power of the Spirit, thus preparing them for effective Christocentric pastoral and missional leadership. The course develops historical, theological, and ministerial themes, and seeks to enable students to develop convictions for ministry and reflect on ecclesial practices such as administration of the sacraments, pastoral care, preaching, prayer, and worship.

R512.830 FOUNDATIONS OF MINISTRY SUPERVISION

Dr David Crawley and Karen Kemp

13 - 17 March | Mon-Fri 9.30am - 4.30pm

31 May - 2 June | Wed-Fri 9.30am - 4.30pm

This is the first of two courses which together comprise a Postgraduate Certificate in Theology, designed to equip graduates to offer professional supervision in a range of ministry contexts (understanding ministry in the broad sense of Christian vocation). It examines the nature and purpose of professional supervision, including its importance in people-related ministries. Several theoretical approaches to supervision will be evaluated and participants will reflect critically on theological, ethical, and cultural dimensions of offering supervision in their own contexts.

R121.830 OLD TESTAMENT NARRATIVE: ITS MESSAGE AND METHOD

14-18 August & 16-20 October | 9.30am - 12.30pm

This course engages in a detailed study of the content and form of Old Testament narrative, and the hermeneutical and theological issues raised by narrative approaches to the Old Testament, illustrated by study of selected Old Testament narrative texts. The significance for preaching and application of the narrative form and content within the various cultural contexts of Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond is also considered.

R236.830 SPECIAL TOPIC: CHRISTIAN THOUGHT AND HISTORY - PATRISTICS PAPER

Dr Edwina Murphy

28 August - 1 September | Mon -Thurs 9am - 5pm, Fri 9am - 1pm

This course provides an opportunity for students to engage in theological or historical disciplines in an advanced way. The course involves a concentrated study of a theological or historical issue. Critical issues of background and context are explored, and contemporary applications to the complex cultural landscapes that exist within Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond are investigated.

R351.830 POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH AND WRITING

R513.830 DEVELOPING A MINISTRY SUPERVISION PRACTICE

2 - 4 August & 13 - 15 September | 9.30am - 4.30pm

This is the second of two courses which comprise a Postgraduate Certificate in Theology, designed to equip graduates to offer professional supervision in a range of ministry contexts (understanding ministry in the broad sense of Christian vocation). Through the integration of theory, practice, and theology, it enables practitioners to develop a framework for supervision appropriate to their own cultural and professional contexts, and to engage in critically reflective practice.

R612.830 THE CHURCH FOR OTHERS

Dr Joe McGarry

4 - 8 September | Mon - Fri 9.30am - 4.30pm

The church's social advocacy is increasingly recognised as a central aspect of her witness in the world. And yet, a call to social action can often be cast aside or seen as just one priority amongst many. This course presents biblical, theological, and historical investigations into the selfemptying existence for others which rests at the heart of Christian existence. Beginning with the biblical witness regarding the community's posture towards the vulnerable, the course then uses Dietrich Bonhoeffer's theological work to guide our discourse. We will hear Bonhoeffer ask, "Is the church the church if she does not exist for others?" and consider the significance of moving social action from the register of mission (something the church does) into the register of being (something the church is). The course will conclude by investigating historical case studies, illuminating how social action for the other historically and consistently emerges when the church lives from her faithful identity in Christ, and how it can be applied in the varied cultural contexts that exist in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

Calling or vocatio is deeply rooted within the Christian tradition as a way of framing the good or faithful life. Courses

R351.830 POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH AND WRITING (30 CREDITS)

This course centres on the methodology and practical aspects of advanced research. Students reflect on the theological, ethical, and missiological implications of research whilst developing advanced skills and methods which will support a research project. A range of scholars relate their own research experience and students engage with a number of contemporary approaches to critical research and writing. Students develop and hone the skills of research and writing by designing and implementing a small research project in the field of their interest.

R352.830 HONOURS SPECIAL TOPIC (30 CREDITS)

This course explores a directed course of study of a chosen discipline of theology. Through a selection of tutoring, class time, guided, and self-directed study, the student will demonstrate a mastery of a specific area of theological study and will communicate effectively relevant theories, principles, and applications over a series of essays.

R362.860 HONOURS RESEARCH PROJECT (60 CREDITS)

This course enables students to develop and deepen, in more specialized areas of study, the skills and knowledge acquired through successful completion of the BTh (or equivalent). Students, in discussion with a supervisor, decide on a research project and conduct their research under supervision. The project must reflect the methodologies and skills appropriate to the subject area in which they are working. This course allows students to develop their theological thinking in a systematic capacity, subject to the constraints and rigours of research methods appropriate to the respective disciplines. As part of the supervision process the student will present regular summaries of their progress to the lecturer and receive feedback on the progress of their proposal.

On completion of the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) Laidlaw College graduates will:

- 1. Have developed skills in advanced research and writing
- 2. Be able to disseminate the results of advanced research to wider networks
- 3. Engage in self-directed learning and advanced study
- 4. Demonstrate intellectual independence, analytic rigour, and the ability to understand and evaluate new knowledge and ideas
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to identify topics for original research, plan and conduct research, analyse results, and communicate the findings to the satisfaction of subject experts.

Certificate in Christian Ministry (Internship) (CertCM)*



level 4, 120 credits

Programme Summary

The Certificate of Christian Ministry (Internship) provides a pathway for emerging Christian leaders to pursue ministry formation and theological study while serving their churches. Students develop knowledge, skills and experience by connecting their own reflection on the Christian faith with real life practical contexts, equipping them for service in the church. The Certificate of Christian Ministry also provides a pathway into further study for further personal and professional development.

Students spend around half their time in ministry placement (including 210 hours per semester of Supervised Ministry Practice), while also grounding themselves in core papers in Bible, Theology, Mission and Discipleship.

Flexible Study Options

The CertCM (Internship) is a one year full-time (or part-time equivalent) programme. The programme is made up of a total of 120 credits.

Students can study in this programme through one of our Partners located around the country or on-site at the Manukau campus.

116.415 ENCOUNTERING THE BIBLE (15 CREDITS)

This course introduces students to the Bible and explores the major themes that occur throughout Genesis to Revelation. It also shows how the Bible can be read so that it speaks into our lives, ministries, and workplaces.

216.415 BASICS OF CHRISTIAN BELIEF (15 CREDITS)

This course introduces students to key ideas and concepts that form the heart of Christian belief. Students will examine how these ideas fit together and shape Christian life and faith, and how they can interact with the wider community.

416.415 DISCIPLESHIP (15 CREDITS)

This course introduces students to key aspects of Christian discipleship. Drawing on the Bible and key ideas in Christian belief students engage in personal reflection and directed exercises connecting faith, life and ministry.

472.430 MINISTRY INTERNSHIP I (30 CREDITS)

In this Internship course students mix practical ministry activity with personal reflection and course learning. They are introduced to personal development, self- and task-management, and the attributes and character of a leader.

473.430 MINISTRY INTERNSHIP II (30 CREDITS)

This Internship course extends students in their supervised ministry practice though personal reflection on their own journey into ministry in relation to a sense of call and personal strengths.



Programme Summary

On completion of the Diploma in Christian Studies students will have developed the capacity to tell the biblical story, to read the Scriptures within their wider historical context and to understand a theological framework for life and ministry. Students will have begun the process of developing the disciplines necessary both to maintain their own spiritual growth and to serve in voluntary leadership capacities within the church and in our world.

The Intercultural Studies strand provides students with an introduction to biblical studies, theological studies and spiritual formation, as well as an initial examination of Christian theology, context, and practice within a particular culture. The aim of the Intercultural Studies strand is to provide graduates who are able to use intercultural skills and practices to bridge gaps among communities in Aotearoa New Zealand, and provide services in local and global Christian ministry, mission organisations, non-governmental and social organisations, and intercultural communities.

Flexible Study Options

Students can study towards the DipCS(IS) on campus in Henderson or Manukau (depending on the timetable). Some courses may be taken by Distance Learning. This programme also allows for a range of flexible learning options, including a combination of on campus and Distance Learning courses, as well as part-time study.

Students who complete the DipCS(IS) may staircase into the second year of the Bachelor of Theology.

The DipCS(IS) is a one year full-time (or part-time equivalent) programme. It is made up of eight level 5, 15-credit courses.

115.515 READING THE BIBLE (15 CREDITS)

Approach the Bible from the perspective of biblical theology, which allows the Bible to tell its own story as a unified grand narrative that culminates in the person and work of Jesus Christ. Explore the unity, diversity, and central themes of the Bible to make sense of the relationship between the Bible, theology, and all of life.

201.515 ENGAGING THEOLOGY (15 CREDITS)

Be introduced to systematic theology and learn to think theologically. You will examine God's self-revelation, how that revelation can be understood, and why it is foundational for Christian faith. You will then explore the arrangement of this revelation into a set of core beliefs and their application to everyday living.

401.515 FORMATION (15 CREDITS)

Explore personal and communal spiritual formation, through engagement with Scripture, theological understandings, and a range of Christian spiritual practices. This reflection will include (1) evaluation of key aspects of your own formation, (2) evaluation of your experiences of personal and communal strategies intended to facilitate spiritual growth, and (3) the development of spiritual practices which will foster your spiritual formation and strengthen your contribution to enhancing human wellbeing within your own social and cultural contexts.

505.515 CHRISTIAN LEADERSHIP & MISSION (15 CREDITS)

Explore Christian leadership and mission by means of the evaluation of personal and community faith journeys, ministry programmes within your context, and your own emerging sense of call and mission.

907.515 BICULTURAL RELATIONSHIPS: TIKANGA KAWENATA (15 CREDITS)

Be introduced to Tikanga Māori on the basis of understanding people in their contexts. 312.515 NGĀ HUNGA HOHOURONGO (THE GOSPEL PEACEMAKERS) (15 CREDITS)

Explore an aspect of Māori responses to the introduction of Te Rongopai—the Gospel—to Māori society. The message of the Gospel contends with utu, war, and the law/lore of tapu. This course provides an overview of peace-orientated Christianity and its impact on Māori society through the reception of the Bible as a book of peace.

OR

313.515 A HISTORY OF PACIFIC CHRISTIANITY (15 CREDITS)

Explore the spread of Christianity in the Pacific. You will look at the critical role that Western and Pasifika missionaries played in the process of evangelisation and the historical development of Pacific churches. You will also look at the growth and influence of diaspora Pacific churches and communities in Aotearoa New Zealand and Australia. This course also reflects on the development of Pacific Christianity and its relevance for Christian life, mission, and ministry today.

EITHER

579.515 NGĀ HUNGA MAIA (FAITH-LED MĀORI LEADERSHIP) (15 CREDITS)

Examine the impact of the Bible and the gospel message on both traditional and contemporary Māori leadership. You will explore the influence of early Māori Christian evangelists in changing traditional leadership roles and the continuation of Māori faith-led leadership in contemporary iwi, hāpori and hāhi transformation.

OR

407.515 DISCIPLING PASIFIKA COMMUNITIES (15 CREDITS)

Explore the expertise and skills for discipleship in the local church, local community, and/or global missions. You will develop an understanding of the practical dimensions of Christian ministry by collaborating with Pasifika role models in church environments and professional vocations. This course will prepare you to minister effectively in Christian missions and inter-cultural communities.

EITHER

649.515 WHAKAPAPA O TE ATUATANGA (GENEALOGY AND GOD) (15 CREDITS)

Have an overview of the relevance of genealogy within both Māori society and the biblical scriptures. Explore how both whakapapa Māori and biblical genealogy is key to connecting to Atua (God), tangata (people), and whenua (land), and look at this concept in the context of identity, adoption, and redemption. Identity, adoption, and redemption are central features of biblical genealogy and speak directly to a Christian whakapapa.

OR

217.515 PASIFIKA THEOLOGY

Explore how theology is done contextually in the Pacific region through the examination of Pacific concepts, stories, and socio-politico-economic structures of life. The understanding developed provides a foundation for shaping Pacific ministries based on biblical interpretation, theological reflection, and religious practice.

By the end of this programme graduates will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate and apply a broad understanding of theology and biblical foundations to defined contexts based on textual interpretation and religious practice.
- 2. Evaluate a ministry programme based on strategies that integrate personal and community faith journeys, and the social, cultural and other contextual considerations of defined groups.
- 3. Use intercultural skills and practices to bridge gaps among communities.
- 4. Provide necessary services in specific roles required of local and global Christian ministry, mission organisations, non-governmental and social service organisations and intercultural communities.

Programme Requirements

Level 8 entry:

The MTh degree may be completed with **180 credits** where the candidate has completed a recognized three-year Bachelor's degree in Theology or Ministry, with a grade point average of 7.0 (B) in courses of the qualifying undergraduate programme at NZQA levels 6 and 7.

The MTh degree requires **240 credits** where the candidate holds a recognised Bachelor's level degree in a discipline other than Theology or Ministry and has completed a bridging programme such as Laidlaw's 120 credit Graduate Diploma in Theology with a grade point average of 7.0 (B) at NZQA level 7.

Level 9 entry:

The MTh degree may be completed with **120 credits** where the candidate has completed a four-year Honours degree in Theology or Ministry with first or second class Honours **OR** a Postgraduate Diploma in Theology with merit.

R140.830 THE GOSPEL AND ITS PROCLAMATION

Dr Mark Keown

22 - 26 May | 9am - 4pm

Our everyday world is an increasingly dynamic mix of faiths, philosophies, cultures, and ideologies in both local and global contexts. In such a world, Christians and their communities still have the imperative to share Christ but often struggle with traditional paradigms of the gospel and its effective proclamation. This course goes deeply into New Testament exploring diverse understandings of the gospel to strengthen our capacity to present the gospel today. It also explores patterns of its proclamation, providing a basis for sharing the gospel in posture, proclamation, and praxis in the complex cultural landscapes that exist within Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

R351.830 POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH AND WRITING

Dr Greg Liston and Dr Terry Pouono

21-24 February | 9am - 5pm

22-24 March | Wed-Thurs 9am - 5pm, Fri 9am - 1:30pm Writer's Workshop (Optional but highly recommended) 24-25 March | 9am - 5pm

Postgraduate Research and Writing introduces you to the wonder and joy of research. R405.830 MENTAL HEALTH AND HUMAN FLOURISHING

Dr Maja Whittaker and Dr Sarah Penwarden

27 - 31 March | 9:30am - 4:30pm

Mental distress can be a common but challenging aspect of human experience. In this course, students will explore how to understand mental distress from within the framework of practical theology. Students will learn how to articulate a theology of mental distress as well as human flourishing and shalom, through a focus on mental health in general and particular experiences such as anxiety, depression and bipolar disorder. Students will gain an understanding of issues of stigma surrounding mental distress in society. Students will evaluate pastoral responses to mental distress, and will articulate an understanding of what a wise, compassionate, and informed pastoral response might involve within the varied cultural contexts of Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

R507.830 ANOINTED MINISTRY

Dr Myk Habets

1-5 May | Mon-Fri 9:30am - 4:30pm, Fri 9:30am-1pm This course examines the doctrine of the Trinity and applies this to pastoral practices in order to allow the doctrine of the Trinity to have a controlling influence over such practices. This course addresses key concerns related to the practice of ministry. By grounding the course in a robust trinitarianism, students will receive a clear biblical and theological foundation for ministry as participation in the ongoing ministry of Christ in the world in the power of the Spirit, thus preparing them for effective Christocentric pastoral and missional leadership. The course develops historical, theological, and ministerial themes, and seeks to enable students to develop convictions for ministry and reflect on ecclesial practices such as administration of the sacraments, pastoral care, preaching, prayer, and worship.

R512.830 FOUNDATIONS OF MINISTRY SUPERVISION

Dr David Crawley and Karen Kemp

13 - 17 March | Mon-Fri 9.30am - 4.30pm

31 May - 2 June | Wed-Fri 9.30am - 4.30pm

This is the first of two courses which together comprise a Postgraduate Certificate in Theology, designed to equip graduates to offer professional supervision in a range of ministry contexts (understanding ministry in the broad sense of Christian vocation). It examines the nature and purpose of professional supervision, including its importance in people-related ministries. Several theoretical approaches to supervision will be evaluated and participants will reflect critically on theological, ethical, and cultural dimensions of offering supervision in their own contexts.

R121.830 OLD TESTAMENT NARRATIVE: ITS MESSAGE AND METHOD

Dr John de Jong

14-18 August & 16-20 October | 9.30am - 12.30pm

This course engages in a detailed study of the content and form of Old Testament narrative, and the hermeneutical and theological issues raised by narrative approaches to the Old Testament, illustrated by study of selected Old Testament narrative texts. The significance for preaching and application of the narrative form and content within the various cultural contexts of Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond is also considered.

R236.830 SPECIAL TOPIC: CHRISTIAN THOUGHT AND HISTORY - PATRISTICS PAPER

Dr Edwina Murphy

28 August - 1 September | Mon -Thurs 9am - 5pm, Fri 9am - 1pm

This course provides an opportunity for students to engage in theological or historical disciplines in an advanced way. The course involves a concentrated study of a theological or historical issue. Critical issues of background and context are explored, and contemporary applications to the complex cultural landscapes that exist within Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond are investigated.

R351.830 POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH AND WRITING

Dr Terry Pouono

By distance throughout the semester

Postgraduate Research and Writing introduces you to the wonder and joy of research. It is a course designed to inspire students with the vast breadth of cutting edge investigations that are being done by the lecturers at Laidlaw, and then to teach them how to research themselves by partnering with one of these lecturers. R505.830 REFLECTIVE PRACTICE FOR MINISTRY

Students will learn to critically evaluate their ministry environment both culturally and contextually, to develop practices of discernment and habits of mind that produce resilience over the long-term, and to understand what they bring to their ministry role from their own personality, context and as a participant in community.

R513.830 DEVELOPING A MINISTRY SUPERVISION PRACTICE

2 - 4 August & 13 - 15 September | 9.30am - 4.30pm

This is the second of two courses which comprise a Postgraduate Certificate in Theology, designed to equip graduates to offer professional supervision in a range of ministry contexts (understanding ministry in the broad sense of Christian vocation). Through the integration of theory, practice, and theology, it enables practitioners to develop a framework for supervision appropriate to their own cultural and professional contexts, and to engage in critically reflective practice.

The church's social advocacy is increasingly recognised as a central aspect of her witness in the world. And yet, a call to social action can often be cast aside or seen as just one priority amongst many. This course presents biblical, theological, and historical investigations into the selfemptying existence for others which rests at the heart of Christian existence. Beginning with the biblical witness regarding the community's posture towards the vulnerable, the course then uses Dietrich Bonhoeffer's theological work to guide our discourse. We will hear Bonhoeffer ask, "Is the church the church if she does not exist for others?" and consider the significance of moving social action from the register of mission (something the church does) into the register of being (something the church is). The course will conclude by investigating historical case studies, illuminating how social action for the other historically and consistently emerges when the church lives from her faithful identity in Christ, and how it can be applied in the varied cultural contexts that exist in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

Calling or vocatio is deeply rooted within the Christian tradition as a way of framing the good or faithful life.
